HOW TO USE EXPLORE THE BIBLE: STUDENTS

LEADER GUIDE

This teaching plan contains three sections:

>> EXPLORATION

This is where you will begin your session. In Exploration there will be two things you do as a leader:

1. Set the context

> Every session will begin with you setting the context for the Scripture that will be studied. Material will be provided in the Exploration section that will allow you to prepare the students for their Exploration time.

2. Lead students into their time of Exploration

- After you have set the context, then guide your students into the Exploration time in their Personal Study Guides. There are several different ways that you can lead your students to explore the Scripture.
 - **1.** Lead your students to work through all of the Scripture and questions, then discuss their responses together as a group.
 - **2.** Guide your students to work through the Scripture and questions one question at a time. Pause for group discussion after each question.

>> CONVERSATION

This part of the study is designed to help you walk through the Scripture with your students. Here you will find:

- **Quick-response questions:** First glance questions to get your students to start thinking more about the passage without getting into too much depth. These are the opening questions to begin the session.
- **Discussion questions:** Questions that are located in the Personal Study Guide with commentary on leading your discussion.

>> LEADER PREP

- **Commentary:** Located on the right-hand page to help answer discussion questions.
- **Context:** Various types of context are included in side columns and labeled with the following symbols:



Literary Context: Key word studies and cross references.



Historical Context: Historical setting, including information on key characters.



Cultural Context: Highlights of the political and cultural environment.



Theological Context: Information to help answer deeper questions from the text.

>> APPLICATION


This portion of the study is designed to highlight the central truth of the passage and help students process the implications of that truth. The application is divided into four pivotal parts:

- > Central Truth
- > Now What?
- > Personal Challenge
- > Keep on Digging
